#### THE BETRAYAL

# The Garden of Gethsemane Matthew 26:36-46

It's probably near *midnight* on the *Thursday* of **Passover** week...**A.D.**33...the last night that Jesus would be alive in human form. His *three* year ministry was nearly completed. He had preached His last public sermon...performed His last miracle...and taught for the last time in the Temple and synagogues. He has just celebrated His last Passover with His disciples before He becomes the final and ultimate Passover Lamb...the perfect and only sacrifice for the sins of the world.

As we look into the last night before His death...we can only grasp a glimpse of this powerful moment. The divine, yet human *agony* and *grief* that He experienced was *excruciating*. The hymn Man of Sorrows proclaims...

Man of sorrows, what a name, For the Son of God who came, Ruined sinners to reclaim! Hallelujah, what a Savior!

This description of Christ is based on Isaiah 53:3.

"He was despised and forsaken of men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; and like one from whom men hide their face He was despised, and we did not esteem Him."

There is no mention in Scripture of Jesus ever *laughing*...but there are numerous accounts of His *grieving*...His *sadness*...and even His *weeping*.

- He was *grieved* at the *hardness of hearts* (Mark 3:5).
- He wept at the grave of Lazarus (John 11:35).
- He wept over Jerusalem at the time of His triumphal entry (Luke 19:41).

He knew *sorrow* and *grief* like no other person who has ever lived. But the *grief* and *sorrow* He experienced in the **Garden of Gethsemane** on the last night before His crucifixion seemed to be an accumulation of all the *agony* and *grief* He had ever known...an *agony* and *grief* which would accelerate to a climax the following day when He would *become sin* on our behalf.

Like every other event and detail of Jesus' life and ministry...His *agony* in the garden was an integral part to the *preordained*, *plan of God* for *redemption*. It was all part of Jesus' *preparation for the cross*...where the climatic event in the work of *redemption* would take place.

## I. HIS SORROW: (vs. 36-38)

Then Jesus came with them to a place called Gethsemane, and said to His disciples, "Sit here while I go over there and pray." (vs. 36)...Gethsemane was a garden on the Mount of Olives...and was a place where Jesus had often met with His disciples (John 18:2). Because it was often used by Jesus...the garden was probably owned by a believer who allowed Him to use it as *a place of retreat* and *prayer*.

**Gethsemane**...means *olive* or *oil press*. In a field covered with *olive* trees, *oil presses* were used to extract oil from the fruit. **John** records that there was an *olive* grove there in **Gethsemane**.

**Pray**...Jesus didn't use the normal word for **praying** (*euchomai*) which was used for *asking* or *petitioning*...instead, He used the Gk. *proseuchomai*, which is *a very intensive word only used when praying to God...coming before God*.

And He took with Him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee (James and John), and began to be grieved and distressed (vs. 37)...

Grieved...Gk. *lypeisthai*, means to be deeply grieved, sorrowful or troubled...to be sad to a point of distress (Matthew 14:9; Matthew 17:23; Matthew 18:31; Matthew 19:22). Jesus was experiencing grief and trouble such as He had never known in His earthly life.

Then He said to them, "My soul is deeply grieved, to the point of death; remain here and keep watch with Me." (vs. 38)...

**Deeply grieved...**Gk. *perilupos*, it carries the idea of *being surrounded or consumed by sorrow*. It's the idea of someone *dying from a broken heart*.

Keep watch with Me...Keep watch literally means to stay awake ...be alert (also in vs. 40, 41).

With everything that had recently transpired with the multiple warnings that Jesus had given the disciples of their *falling away* and *denying Him*...they were at a *crisis point* even though they

didn't know it. They should have seen this request of Jesus as a time for *deep concern* and *fervent prayer*. But there's no indication anywhere in Scripture that they ever said a single word in **prayer** during this time. It only says that they were **sleeping**. As Jesus retreated to *pray*...the disciples retreated to *sleep*.

In this hour of His greatest need, the Lord wanted those closest to Him...those who had a *sympathetic understanding*...to be praying with Him. But like many believers throughout the history of the church...the disciples may have had *good intentions*...but they were *weak* and *weary*.

Jesus had a *desperate need for communion* with His heavenly Father. But his *weak* and *weary* disciples...as is often the case today with believers and the church...they *felt no desperation*. They were more concerned with their *own needs*. In this case, a need to **sleep**.

Every Christian will at some time in their life, face *temptations*, *trials*, and *grief* that threaten to overwhelm them. But these are the times when only *direct*, *intimate communion* with the Lord in *intense* and *fervent prayer* can provide the strength to meet our desperate need.

## II. HIS <u>SUPPLICATION</u>: (vs. 39-45a)

The *intensity* of Jesus' prayer *increased* with *each of the three sessions* and it's reflected in the *positions* and *posture* He took.

- At first, He *knelt* (Luke 22:41).
- He then *fell prostrate on His face* (vs. 39).
- Finally, He was praying with such intensity that *His sweat* became like drops of blood, falling down upon the ground. (Luke 22:43-44).

And He went a little beyond them, and fell on His face and prayed, saying, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from Me; yet not as I will, but as You will." (vs. 39)...

My Father...Except when He quoted Psalm 22:1 as He cried out from the cross, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" (Matthew 27:46), Jesus always addressed God as Father. In doing so, He was expressing an intimacy with God that was foreign to the Jews of that day...and it was an abomination to the religious leaders. Mark also adds that Jesus addressed Him as Abba Father

(Mark 14:36). *Abba* is an *Aramaic* word of *endearment*...equivalent to *Daddy*. Such an address was unthinkable to the Jews...and was considered *presumptuous* and *blasphemous*.

If it is possible, let this cup pass from Me...this cup...refers to His imminent death and everything associated with it...His suffering...His coming separation from the Father (Matthew 27:46)... and His becoming sin for mankind. Jesus was asking if avoiding the cross was possible within the Father's redemptive plan and purpose.

"He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him."

~II Corinthians 5:21

A **cup**...figuratively in the Old Testament, refers to **wrath** and **judg-ment**. Here it symbolized the **judgment** Jesus would endure on the cross.

**Yet not as I will, but as You will...**The significant thing about this prayer was that the Lord *submitted* His **will** to the **will** of His Father.

And He came to the disciples and found them sleeping, and said to Peter, "So, you men could not keep watch with Me for one hour? (vs. 40)...

When Jesus *returned to the three*, He found them sleeping. It was probably around *midnight* and the need for sleep at that hour was natural. Plus, Jesus and the disciples had just had a long and hectic day...and they had just finished a large meal. Yet...these *three* were asleep at the moment of the *greatest spiritual conflict* in the history of the world.

He woke them and reprimanded **Peter**...**not** the other two...but **Peter** for his inability to abide with Him in prayer. This is to further point out to **Peter** that only a short time before, he had twice said that he would never forsake the Lord (vs. 33, 35)...yet he couldn't even pray with Him in His greatest need.

Keep watching and praying that you may not enter into temptation; the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak." (vs. 41)...

Jesus encouraged them...

**Keep watching and praying...**both are *present imperatives* and carry the idea of *continuous action*...indicated with the word **keep**. The need for spiritual vigilance *isn't occasional*...but *continuous*.

You...plural...referring to all three.

The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak...Doing what is right is often difficult. We may have the best of intensions, but we end up like **Paul**...doing exactly what we know we shouldn't do, while not doing that which we know we should be doing (**Romans 7:15-20**).

He went away again a second time and prayed, saying, "My Father, if this cannot pass away unless I drink it, Your will be done." (vs. 42)...

As Jesus prayed a second time...He recognized that the cup (vs. 39) could not pass away unless He *drank it*.

Your will be done...again, He affirmed a second time that *God's* will must be accomplished...whatever the cost (vs. 39, 42).

Again He came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy (vs. 43)...

The disciples had fallen back asleep, even after He had awakened them. He returned and **found** the *three disciples* asleep **again**, but this time *He didn't wake them*.

And He left them again, and went away and prayed a third time, saying the same thing once more (vs. 44)...

For **a third time** Jesus **prayed** the **same** *prayer* while the disciples slept.

Then He came to the disciples and said to them, "Are you still sleeping and resting? (vs. 45a)...

The disciples **sleeping and resting** was in *stark contrast* to His *agonizing* (vs. 37) and *praying*...to the point of *exhaustion* and *perspiration*.

"Now an angel from heaven appeared to Him, strengthening Him. And being in agony He was praying very fervently; and His sweat became like drops of blood, falling down upon the ground." ~Luke 22:43-44

Jesus was alone. Even though the disciples were nearby, they were useless with their lack of intercession. They were controlled by the

*flesh* rather than by the *spirit*. And yet, Jesus evidenced *steadfast obedience*...a determination to follow the Father's **will** *regardless of the cost*.

### **III. HIS <u>SEIZURE</u>**: (vs. 45b-46)

Behold, the hour is at hand and the Son of Man is being betrayed into the hands of sinners (vs. 45b)...As Jesus walked back to the three disciples, the men coming to arrest Him were already within sight. In fact, they were approaching while He was still speaking to the disciples (vs. 47).

The hour is at hand...the time had come for Him to become sin... to be the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world (John 1:29)!

The Son of Man is being betrayed into the hands of sinners... When Jesus *returned* to the disciples the third time...He woke them up with the news that His betrayer was coming and they must go meet him.

Get up, let us be going; behold, the one who betrays Me is at hand!" (vs. 46)...Instead of waiting for His enemies to come to Him...He went out to meet them. Jesus made the ultimate and final act of commitment to His Father's will. A prime illustration that...

"For this reason the Father loves Me, because I lay down My life so that I may take it again. No one has taken it away from Me, but I lay it down on My own initiative. I have authority to lay it down, and I have authority to take it up again. This commandment I received from My Father."

~John 10:17-18

#### LESSONS WE CAN LEARN:

- The two weapons that Jesus used when facing trials and temptation were <u>Scripture</u> and <u>prayer</u>...the same weapons the Lord provides each of His children (<u>Ephesians 6:17-18</u>).
- The first step of a believer's falling into sin is <u>pride</u> and <u>self-confidence</u>...the belief that he is able to be faithful to the Lord in his own <u>strength</u> and <u>power</u>. The disciples never believed that they would fall away and deny Jesus. They never intended to fall asleep when they should have been <u>fervently praying</u> and <u>keeping watch</u> with Him.
