# HOW WILL YOU FINISH? DANIEL...Living a Life of Faith in an Increasingly Hostile World Daniel 1-12

Because of *Israel's sin* of *idolatry*, the *times of the Gentiles rule* has come...a time when God *turns Israel over* to be *captives*. It *began with the sins of Solomon* and the *dividing* of the nation of Israel. *Ten tribes* become the Northern Kingdom and are known as Israel. Judah and Benjamin become the Southern Kingdom and are know as Judah or Judea. The Northern Kingdom turns to *idolatry* and are *defeated* by the Assyrians. The *righteous* out of the *ten tribes migrated* to the *south*...and united with Judea and Benjamin. They had a *season of righteousness*, but eventually they also *rebelled* and eventually turned to *idolatry*. As a result, they were *defeated* and placed into *captivity* in Babylon and this is where the book of Daniel begins.

Babylon rebelled against the Assyrian Empire in 626 B.C. and overthrew the Assyrian capital of Nineveh in 621 B.C. Babylon then became the master of the Middle East when it defeated the Egyptian armies in 605 B.C.

About 8 years before Ezekiel was taken captive by
Nebuchadnezzar, a young man named Daniel (whose name means "God is Judge") was taken from Jerusalem to
Babylon by Nebuchadnezzar. Deported to Babylon at the age of 16, Daniel was hand-picked for government service.
Daniel's life and ministry bridge the entire 70-year period of Babylonian captivity as a prophet and a government official.
And he continued on after Babylon was overcome by the Medes and Persians in 539 B.C. Daniel became God's prophetic voice to both the Gentile and Jewish world declaring God's present and eternal purpose. Nine of the twelve chapters in his book revolve around dreams, including

God-given *visions* involving *trees*, *animals*, *beast*, and *images*. In both his *personal adventures* and *prophetic visions*, **Daniel** shows God's *guidance*, *intervention*, and *power* in the *affairs of man*.

His *prophetic ministry* was focused to both...the *Gentile courts* of **Babylon** (Nebuchadnezzar and Belshazzar) and Persia (Darius and Cyrus), as well as to *his Jewish countrymen*. Eventually **Zerubbabel** *would lead a return* of the **Jews** to **Jerusalem** in the *first year* of Cyrus. Daniel lived and ministered at least *until the third year* of Cyrus (536 B.C. ...Daniel 10:1).

The book of **Daniel** is the Old Testament book of *apocalypse*...while **Revelation** is the New Testament book of *apocalypse*. The word *apocalypse* means *an unveiling of the secret purposes of God*...and the *secret purposes of God* can never be known until they are *revealed*. God used **Daniel** to *unveil* these *purposes*.

## I. DANIEL'S UNCOMPROMISING CHARACTER:

**Daniel's** *life* was *characterized* by *faith*, *prayer*, *courage*, *consistency*, and *lack of compromise*. He was "*highly esteemed*" in the eyes of God (**Daniel 9:23**; **10:11**, **19**). He was even *mentioned three times* by his 6<sup>th</sup> *century B.C.* contemporary, **Ezekiel**, as an example of *righteousness*.

Daniel and his three friends (Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah) were evidently born into noble Judean families and were... "youths in whom was no defect, who were good-looking, showing intelligence in every branch of wisdom, endowed with understanding and discerning knowledge, and who had ability for serving in the king's court; and he ordered him to teach them the literature and language of the Chaldeans." (Daniel 1:4). They were given 3 years of training in the best of the Babylon's schools (Daniel 1:5). As part of the reidentification

process, each was given a new name. Daniel was given a name that honored one of the Babylonian deities...

Belteshazzar...which meant, "Bel protects his life"
(Daniel 1:7; 4:8; Jeremiah 51:44). Daniel's wisdom and divinely given interpretive abilities brought him into a position of prominence, especially in the courts of Nebuchadnezzar and Darius. He is one of the few characters in the Bible about whom nothing negative is every written.

**Examples of Daniel's uncompromising character:** 

Daniel 1:8-16...Would not defile himself.

Not only did **Daniel** have **uncompromising character**, but so did his friends. **Daniel 3**...*The fiery furnace*...a *test of faith* (**Shadrach**, **Meshach**, and **Abed-nego**).

### II. DANIEL'S CONSISTENT CONVICTION:

**Daniel 1:18-20...** Wisdom and understanding...ten times better than all the magicians and conjurers.

Daniel 6...Daniel's continued prayer and worship three times a day even after Darius' decree..."according to the law of the Medes and Persians."

# III. DANIEL'S COMPLETE CONFIDENCE:

The central truth in Daniel is..."...That the most High is ruler over the realm of mankind and bestows it on whomever He wishes."

~Daniel 4:32b (Also see Daniel 4:17, 25)

The sovereignty of God is the core of this book and can be seen operating in both the spiritual and the political realms. In the narratives of events in the lives of Daniel and his friends, the emphasis is on living a life of faith in an increasingly hostile world. God's sovereignty is seen in God's ability to prosper or deliver those who are true to their faith convictions.

God's sovereignty in political affairs is addressed more directly in the visions of the book. The purpose was to deal with Israel's expectations while in exile, as well as, post-exile. Based on their reading of the earlier prophets, the people of Israel were looking for the kingdom of God to be established upon their return from seventy years of exile. Daniel's visions informed them that four kingdoms were yet to come before the establishment of God's kingdom...and that while the return from exile would come within seventy years of Jeremiah's prophecy, this should not be confused with the full restoration. Rather than seventy years, the required span would be seventy weeks of years...seventy times seven...or 490 years.

In the meantime, the **Israelites** were to *live out their faith* in a *Gentile world* under *circumstances* that would make it more and more *difficult* to do so. They had to count on the *sovereignty of God* to *sustain* them *generation by generation*, *crisis by crisis*. They also had to *trust* the *power of God* to *control the flow of world empires* as they *rose* and *fell*. God's *agenda* is *never in jeopardy*; nevertheless, they needed to be *prepared for the long term*.

## Daniel 7-12...Daniel's visions.

- Daniel 7...Daniel's vision of the four beasts and the Ancient of Day.
- Daniel 8...Daniel's vision of the ram, goat, and small horn.
- Daniel 9...Daniel's prophecy of seventy weeks of years.
- Daniel 10-11...Daniel's panorama vision of prophecy concerning the nations of Persia, Greece, and Egypt, and of Antiochus Epiphanes and of the Antichrist.
- Daniel 12...Daniel's prophecy concerning Israel.

#### IV. DANIEL'S COMPELLING COURAGE:

Every time **Nebuchadnezzar** had a *dream*, **Daniel** was called upon to *interpret the dream* or *vision*. Regardless of whether the *dream* or *vision* had a *good* or *bad outcome*, **Daniel** was *faithful* to *interpret the fulfillment of the dream or vision truthfully*.

**Daniel 2:14-45**...(key...**vs. 28**) *Four kingdoms*.

Daniel 4...Nebuchadnezzar's vision of the high tree.

"Twelve months later he was walking on the roof of the royal palace of Babylon. The king reflected and said, 'Is this not Babylon the great, which I myself have built as a royal residence by the might of my power and for the glory of my majesty?' While the word was in the king's mouth, a voice came from heaven, saying, 'King Nebuchadnezzar, to you it is declared: sovereignty has been removed from you, and you will be driven away from mankind, and your dwelling place will be with the beasts of the field. You will be given grass to eat like cattle, and seven periods of time will pass over you until you recognize that the Most High is ruler over the realm of mankind and bestows it on whomever He wishes.' Immediately the word concerning Nebuchadnezzar was fulfilled; and he was driven away from mankind and began eating grass like cattle, and his body was drenched with the dew of heaven until his hair had grown like eagles' feathers and his nails like birds' claws."

~Daniel 4:29-33

Hand writing on the wall...Belshazzar, Nebuchadnezzar's son (Daniel 5). Daniel's sermon...Daniel 5:17-29. Darius the Mede then received the kingdom (Daniel 5:31).

Daniel in the *lions' den* (Daniel 6:10-11, 16, 21-23).

#### LESSONS WE CAN LEARN:

• God is at <u>WORK</u> in the midst of every circumstance in our lives...even when we don't see His hand.

"In the same way the Spirit also helps our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we should, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words...And we know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose."

- We must learn to live an <u>UNCOMPRISING</u> life... regardless of the results.
- God is <u>FAITHFUL</u>...even when life is full of trials and tough situations.
