King Solomon: The Wisest Man Who Ever Lived Teaching Important Lessons For People Today I Kings; II Chronicles

I Kings 1:28-30, 33-35, 37, 47-48; I Kings 12:1-4 KEY VERSE:

"Did not Solomon king of Israel sin regarding these things? Yet among the many nations there was no king like him, and he was loved by his God, and God made him king over all Israel; nevertheless the foreign women caused even him to sin."

~Nehemiah 13:26

King Solomon was the wisest man who ever lived and also one of the most foolish. God gifted him with unsurpassed wisdom, which Solomon squandered by disobeying God's commandments.

Born around 1010 BC, Solomon was the *tenth son* of King David and the *second son* of Bathsheba. His name means "peaceable." His alternative name was Jedidiah, meaning "beloved of the Lord." Even as a baby, Solomon was loved by God. Like his grandfather, King Saul, and his father, King David, King Solomon reigned for 40 years in one of the highest and most prosperous periods in Israel's history... called by many, "The Golden Age" of Israel.

King David died from natural causes in 961 BC and was buried in Jerusalem. It was trough the lineage of David that the eternal kingdom of God was established. Before his death, David anointed Solomon as his successor and gave his final admonition to his son, Solomon, saying...

"Be strong, therefore, and show yourself a man. Keep the charge of the Lord your God, to walk in His ways, to keep His statutes, His commandments, His ordinances, and His testimonies, according to what is written in the Law of Moses, that you may succeed in all that you do and wherever you turn, so that the Lord may carry out His promise which He spoke concerning me, saying, 'If your sons are careful of their way, to walk before Me in truth with all their heart and with all their soul, you shall not lack a man on the throne of Israel.'...for you are a wise man."

~I Kings 2:2b-4, 9b

A conspiracy by Solomon's half-brother Adonijah tried to rob Solomon of the throne. To take the kingship, Solomon had to kill Adonijah and Joab, David's key general.

Once **Solomon's** kingship was firmly established, God appeared to **Solomon** in a dream and promised him anything he asked. **Solomon** chose understanding and discernment, asking God to help him govern his people well and wisely. God was so pleased with the request that He granted it, along with great riches, honor, and longevity.

"God said to him, 'Because you have asked this thing and have not asked for yourself long life, nor have asked riches for yourself, nor have you asked for the life of your enemies, but have asked for yourself discernment to understand justice, behold, I have done according to your words.

Behold, I have given you a wise and discerning heart, so that there has been no one like you before you, nor shall one like you arise after you. I have also given you what you have not asked, both riches and honor, so that there will not be any among the kings like you all your days. If you walk in My ways, keeping My statutes and commandments, as your father David walked, then I will prolong your days.' Then Solomon awoke, and behold, it was a dream. And he

came to Jerusalem and stood before the ark of the covenant of the Lord, and offered burnt offerings and made peace offerings, and made a feast for all his servants."

~I Kings 3:11-15

Solomon's downfall began when he married the daughter of the Egyptian Pharaoh to seal a political alliance...a violation of God's command for him not to have a foreign wife. He could not control his lust. Among Solomon's 700 wives and 300 concubines were many foreigners, which angered God. The inevitable happened...just as God had warned...they lured King Solomon away from Yahweh into worshipping false gods and idols.

Over his 40-year reign, Solomon did many great things, but he succumbed to the temptations of lesser men. The peace a united Israel enjoyed, the massive building projects he headed, and the successful commerce he developed became meaningless when Solomon stopped pursuing God.

KING SOLOMON'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

Solomon set up the most *organized state* in **Israel's** history, with *many officials* to *assist* him. The country was *divided into 12 major districts*, with *each district providing* for the *king's court* during *one month each year*. The system was *fair* and *just*, *distributing* the *tax burden evenly* over the entire country.

Solomon built the *first temple* on **Mount Moriah** in **Jerusalem**, a *seven-year task* that became one of the *wonders* of the ancient world.

The **Queen of Sheba** heard of **Solomon's** *fame* and *visited* him to *test his wisdom* with *hard questions*. After seeing with her own eyes all that **Solomon** had built in **Jerusalem**, and *hearing his wisdom*, the queen *blessed* the God of **Israel**, saying:

"...It was a true report which I heard in my own land about your words and your wisdom. Nevertheless I did not believe the reports, until I came and my eyes had seen it. And behold, the half was not told me. You exceed in wisdom and prosperity the report which I heard'."

~I Kings 10:6-7

Solomon, a *prolific writer*, *poet*, and *scientist*, is credited with writing much of the **book of Proverbs**, **the Song of Solomon**, the **book of Ecclesiastes**, and *two* **Psalms**. **First Kings 4:32** tells us he wrote *3,000 proverbs* and *1,005 songs*.

SOLOMON'S TEMPLE:

Solomon is credited in the Bible with the planning, funding, and executing of the building of the Temple to house the Ark of the Covenant...fulfilling the desire of his father, King David, and God. The building of the Temple is recorded in I Kings and II Chronicles, with the ground-breaking beginning in the fourth year of his reign, and construction being completed seven years later with an elaborate dedication. In the seven-day celebration, Solomon sacrificed 22,000 oxen and 120,000 sheep to celebrate the Temple's completion and God's willingness to dwell among them.

The architectural design of the Temple was modeled after the Tabernacle that had housed the Ark of the Covenant. Quite lavish, it was double the size and built mainly from stone, with cedar paneling to hide all masonry, which was overlaid with gold. The inside of the Temple was decorated with elaborate carvings (gourds and open flowers), golden lampstands, an altar of incense (also called "the golden altar"), and two bronze pillars among other embellishments. In a less-advanced architectural age, at over 100 feet long by 40 feet wide by 60 feet high and with outer doors of ivory, Solomon's Temple must have seemed an impossibility. Yet, a miraculous achievement for those Israelites who saw it.

According to Scripture, after the Temple was completed, Solomon had the Ark of the Covenant finally moved from the tent that King David had made for it and placed it in its specialized chamber on the most western end of the Temple called, "The Holy of Holies." A perfect 20 x 20 x 20 ft. cube, this was the most sacred room that no one besides the Chief Priest could enter without dying...and then, only on the Day of Atonement. Spiritually and nationally, it was the joining of God with His People through His mediator...the high priest. The Temple didn't just house the Levitical priests of God. Side rooms and a courtyard were constructed around the whole building, with areas sectioned off for both the priests and the common people of Israel.

SOLOMON THE BUILDER:

Being a builder, King Solomon also engaged in other construction projects such as his personal palace, the Palace of the Forest of Lebanon, the Hall of the Pillars, and the Hall of Justice. And Solomon didn't restrict his projects to Jerusalem alone.

- He rebuilt several cities.
- He *commissioned fleets of ships* and *built numerous harbors* to accommodate the *bounty* from the *trade routes*.
- He constructed stables to house his thousands of horses and chariots.
- Finally, he *helped erect* (using the *plunder from the Temple* by the **Assyrians** or **Babylonians**) the famous *Hanging Gardens*...considered one of the legendary *Seven Wonders of the World*.

After *securing peace* with his neighbors, he *built up trade* and *became the wealthiest king* of his time.

SOLOMON'S STRENGTHS:

King Solomon greatest strength was his unsurpassed wisdom, granted to him by God. In one biblical episode, two women came to him with a dispute. Both lived in the same house and both had recently delivered newborns. But one of the infants had died. The mother of the dead baby tried to take the living child from the other mother. Because no other witnesses lived in the house, the women were left to dispute who the living child belonged to and who was the true mother. Both claimed to have given birth to the baby.

They asked **Solomon** to *determine which of the two* of them *should keep* the *newborn*. With *astonishing wisdom*, **Solomon** suggested that the *boy be cut in half* with a sword and *split* between the *two women*. *Deeply moved* by *love* for *her son*, the *first woman* whose *baby was alive* said to the king, "*Please, my lord, give her the living baby! Don't kill him!*"

But the *other woman* said, "Neither I nor you shall have him. Cut him in two!" Solomon ruled that the first woman was the real mother because she preferred giving up her child to seeing him harmed (I Kings 3:16-28).

King Solomon's skills in architecture and management turned Israel into the showplace of the Middle East. As a diplomat, he made treaties and alliances that brought peace to his kingdom.

SOLOMON'S WEAKNESSES:

To satisfy his curious mind, Solomon turned to worldly pleasures instead of the pursuit of God. He collected all sorts of treasures, and surrounded himself with luxury. In the case of non-Jewish wives and concubines, he let lust rule his heart instead of obedience to God. He also began to tax his subjects heavily, drafted them into his army, and placed them into slave-like labor for his building projects.

SOLOMON'S LOSING FAVOR WITH GOD:

Despite all his great accomplishments, Scripture indicate that the decline of Solomon was similar to the fall of Saul and David...similar, in that personal vanity and religious and moral compromise led to social disintegration and strife within Israel. Solomon didn't obey the command of God.

"Now King Solomon loved many foreign women along with the daughter of Pharaoh: Moabite, Ammonite, Edomite, Sidonian, and Hittite women, from the nations concerning which the Lord had said to the sons of Israel, 'You shall not associate with them, nor shall they associate with you, for they will surely turn your heart away after their gods.' Solomon held fast to these in love. He had seven hundred wives, princesses, and three hundred concubines, and his wives turned his heart away."

~I Kings 11:1-3

That's when **Solomon** *slowly began* to see his *relationship* with God *decline*. In order to *appease* his *many foreign wives*, and in order to *protect the prosperity* and *longevity* of his *rule*, he *compromised*. Ultimately...

"When Solomon was old, his wives turned his heart away after other gods; and his heart was not wholly devoted to the Lord his God, as the heart of David his father had been."

~I Kings 11:4

Solomon's *ungrateful*, *disloyal actions* and *attitude*...despite being the *wisest* and *most blessed* man on the earth...*provoked* the *anger* and *judgment* of the Lord.

"Solomon did what was evil in the sight of the Lord, and did not follow the Lord fully, as David his father had done."

~I Kings 11:6

Although still able to keep control of the nation of Israel because of God's promise to his father, King David,
Solomon lost the protection and favor of God that earlier had provided remarkable peace and prosperity when he was obedient to God. Solomon soon found new challenges from within and without his kingdom.

"Now the Lord was angry with Solomon because his heart was turned away from the Lord, the God of Israel, who had appeared to him twice, and had commanded him concerning this thing, that he should not go after other gods; but he did not observe what the Lord had commanded. So the Lord said to Solomon, 'Because you have done this, and you have not kept My covenant and My statutes, which I have commanded you, I will surely tear the kingdom from you, and will give it to your servant. Nevertheless I will not do it in your days for the sake of your father David, but I will tear it out of the hand of your son'."

~I Kings 11:9-12

King Solomon died of natural causes in 931 BC at the age of 80. His son, Rehoboam, inherited the throne, which led to a civil war and caused Israel to become a divided nation in 930 BC.

LESSONS WE CAN LEARN:

- God must to be our <u>FIRST LOVE</u>, and we shouldn't let <u>ANYTHING</u> come before him.
- When we worship <u>POSSESSIONS</u> and <u>FAME</u> over God, we are headed for a <u>FALL</u>.
- There is a <u>HIGH COST</u> to compromising God's <u>COMMANDS</u> (truths). We have seen it with Saul, David, and now Solomon. (I.e. Marrying an unbeliever...being unequally yoked).
